The Role of the Guide

- Flexibility in service design for variations in context
- Within a clearly defined and demarcated framework of what Housing First is, and what it is not
- In practice, ensuring high philosophical fidelity with Pathways Model
- But enabling practical modifications to operation





Following Core Principles

- Housing is a human right
- Choice and control for service users
- Separation of housing and treatment
- Recovery orientation
- Harm reduction
- Active engagement without coercion
- Person-centred planning
- Flexible support for as long as is required





Allowing operational differences

- Two examples
- Housing
- Support





Housing

- Original Pathways model used the private rented sector, leasing arrangements
- Where social housing exists and is suitable, no reason not to use that
 - More secure
 - More affordable
 - Full tenancy rights
- What is practical in terms of providing housing will vary between countries
- But cannot compromise on housing 'first' not 'last' or on choice of where to live





Support

- Original Pathways model used ACT and ICM team
- In a context where access to healthcare, psychiatric services and drug/alcohol services was often limited
- Northern EU, universal or near universal health systems, in that context using case management only becomes practical
 - And more affordable...





Summary

- Ignoring the core principles, or only following some of them, means a service is not Housing First
- But being totally inflexible about how Housing First is delivered is equally problematic
- Simply replicating every detail of the original model is not useful, it was designed for New York, not Brussels, Amsterdam, Madrid or London
