

The inflow and outflow of refugees has stabilized, both at ca. 25,000 a day





Housing situation

Housing situation in PL grim even before the war ■ No long-term government/municipal initiatives (so far only a 4 months allowance for hosts) NGOs capable only of minor housing initiatives Fatigue among solidarity host families ☐ Rents went through the roof (25-33% in first 2 weeks), private rental market drained, affecting PL citizens too Minimum wage is not enough to pay rent in major cities ☐ Refugees staying in temporary shelter much longer than planned, esp. vulnerable groups Number of people returning to temporary shelter raising Major humanitarian crisis still possible (winter!) So far **no rough sleeping refugees reported** (but...) ☐ Growing number of Polish rough sleepers and extremely poor in housing





Other key issues

- ☐ Poverty / basic subsistence
 - □ labour market / small municipalities vs. major cities / "over-qualification" / minimum wages
 - ☐ inflation / energy & fuel prices / rents
 - ☐ pre-school child care
- ☐ Language
- □ Accessing services / administrative issues / knowledge of legal system / refugees in PESEL registry
- Psychological condition / PTSD
- Education
- ☐ Vulnerable groups with multiple issues (Roma refugees!)
- ☐ Support fatigue / possible perception changes among Polish society

What are NGOs doing now?

Reception
Shelter & housing:
beds in existing homeless shelters & hostels
 temporary shelters for refugees (running or providing on-site services)
existing supported housing usage
renovating municipal stock & unused buildings (v. small numbers!)
Food, clothes, other in-kind help (incl. to UA)
Social, legal, medical, psychological suport
Language courses, translations
Day-care for children, education support
Ambulance transports for ill, disabled, wounded (incl. from UA & to EU)
Employment aid (also in refugee services & social enterprises)
Integration & cultural events
Fundraising
